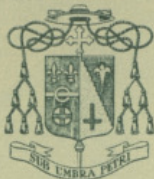


HIS HOLINESS POPE JOHN XXIII

The long anticipated division of the Philadelphia Diocese occurred during the Centennial year - Feb. 15, 1961 - when Rome announced the establishment of the new Diocese of Allentown which includes the five counties of Berks, Lehigh, Northampton, Carbon and Schuylkill.

On April 11, 1961, His Excellency, The Most Reverend Joseph McShea was installed in the Cathedral of St. Catherine of Siena in Allentown, Pa. as the first bishop of the new diocese.

“...I have lived one hundred years”

I*N the ageless time-piece of God's universe 100 years is but a fleeting moment, yet within that very moment I was born and lived and flourished. I have seen countless others born, live out their lives and become numbered among the souls in eternity.*

The acts men perform are carved indelibly on the mighty panorama of history and I am a segment of that panorama. I am the parish. In this volume is recounted a review of the happy memories embraced by one hundred years. It is the story of the people I have known and loved and who, in turn, have loved me. It is the story of the first hundred years of my life and a prologue to the next hundred...and the next hundred. I am the Parish . . . St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church, Reading, Pennsylvania, in the Diocese of Allentown. I was born in 1860.

What have I seen? To recount in detail would fill a hundred such volumes. Mostly I have seen people, for the parish is its people and for the people the parish is truly the Catholic Church.

I have seen you Baptized. I have witnessed your first Holy Communion and your Confirmation. You made your first Confession here and on the altar of my church you received the sacrament of Holy Matrimony. I have watched many among you become “fellow laborers with Christ” in the Holy Priesthood. You have blessed me with vocations to the Sisterhood and the Brotherhood. At the altars of my church you have knelt countless times to receive the spotless Lamb of God in the Holy Eucharist and, too, I have sped many of you to your eternal reward with the solemn strains of the funeral Mass and the familiar prayers of my priests.

What have I seen? I have seen dreams on drawing boards become realities in brick and mortar and marble and wood . . . a church, a school, a convent. Mostly I have seen you . . . for it is you who have nourished me with loving hands, My first hundred years is your first hundred year.

“...a niche is carved...my life begins”

READING, PENNSYLVANIA, U.S.A. . . . 1860 . . . a City destined to become a part of the pattern in the growing fabric of the Catholic Church in America. Until 1860 the increasing Catholic population of Reading and its environs revolved around St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church. Numbering more than 3,000 souls, mostly Irish and German, the Catholic population was growing beyond the capacity of St. Peter's to adequately care for their needs. This, together with language barriers and old world conflicts of customs, convinced the venerable Bishop John N. Nemann to establish a second Catholic parish in Reading. An so . . . in 1860, amid the ominous clouds of the coming Civil War, I, the Parish of St. Paul was born.

Shortly after my first few breaths of life the untimely death of the saintly Bishop Neumann, before he could appoint a pastor to my infant parish, brought my growth to a temporary halt. But not for long. On May 3, 1860, I welcomed the coming of Rev. Charles J. Schrader, Pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church of Allentown, Pa. and a nephew of the Bishop of Hildesheim, Germany. Sent to me by Bishop Wood of Philadelphia, Fr. Schrader lived at St. Peter's as an assistant on a salary of \$50.00 a month paid by his parishioners, and labored diligently toward the day when construction of my new church would begin, and begin it did, only three months later in August of 1860.

Already my people, who lovingly nourished my one hundred years of growth, had begun to work for me. Mr.

Anthony Felix Sr. donated a lot, 80 ft. x 225 ft. at the corner of 9th and Walnut Sts. for my church. He inaugurated a building fund campaign and personally helped in digging the foundation. On September 8, 1860 Bishop Wood laid the cornerstone of my new church. I was ravidly “coming of age” from humble beginnings.

By 1861 my people had grown in numbers and in that year I saw Bishop Wood dedicate my new church, the second Catholic church in Reaing . . . St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church.

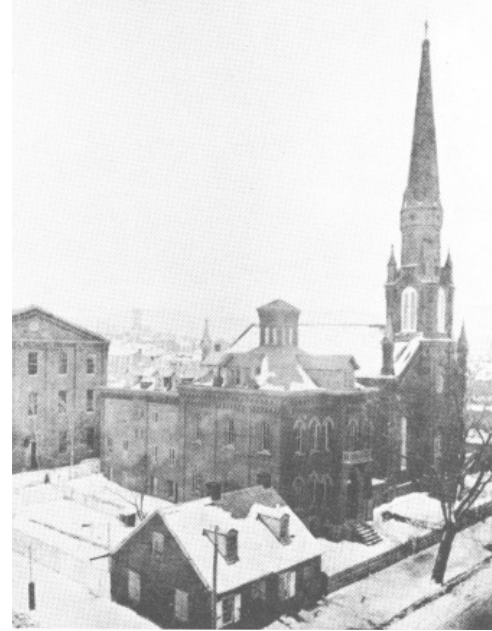
Now I witnessed, sadly, the failing health of Fr. Schrader and his subsequent death in St. Joseph's Hospital in Philadelphia. Thus the eminent administration of my first pastor came to an end.

Once again I welcomed a new pastor, Rev. Gerhard Wallmeyer, a young priest, intelligent, industrious, obliging, whom my people took to their hearts immediately. Fr. Wallmeyer put me on a sound financial basis and it was not long before I witnessed the foundations of Catholic education at St. Paul's when he opened a small boys' school in the basement of my church.

Again God's plans prevailed and Fr. Wallmeyer died of typhoid fever in 1867. His passing was an occasion of mourning, not only for the people of St. Paul's, but by the entire city of Reading. Factories were closed so that those who loved him could witness his funeral.

In February 1867 I once again welcomed a new pastor

Fr. Schrader, the first rector of St. Paul's, was appointed in May 1860 by Bishop Wood of Philadelphia. Fr. Schrader guided the building of the original church at 9th and Walnut Sts. in Reading. He died in 1865.

sent to me by Bishop Wood. His name, Rev. George Bornemann. Fr. Bornemann's subsequent 57 years at St. Paul's were destined to become synonymous with the flourishing of Catholicism in Reading and Berks County.

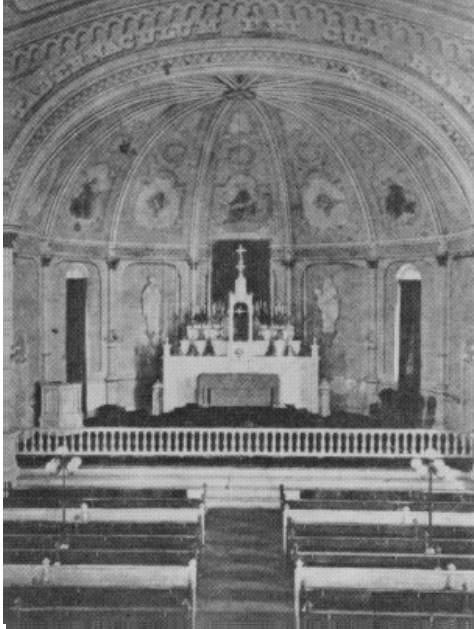
Under Fr. Bornemann's priestly hand I grew rapidly in numbers until my church became too small. In happy memory let me recount briefly the events of these momentous decades in my one hundred years of life.

- 1869 - a 200 ft. spire is erected on the church. Cornerstone of new school building is laid.
- 1870 - school is dedicated and opened. 400 children are enrolled under the direction of the Servant Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary.
- 1871 - a suitable rectory is built beside the church. Professor Erasmus Duppius, a lay teacher, begins a 44 year career as organist and teacher in the higher grades.
- 1872 - amid a smallpox epidemic Fr. Bornemann establishes a Catholic hospital, (now St. Joseph's Hospital), at the northeast corner of Birch and Walnut Sts. under the direction of the Sisters of St. Francis from Glenn Riddle. Today St. Joseph's is a major hospital in the community.
- 1875 - Fr. Bornemann, desiring to preserve the German language and customs, brings Sisters Cassiana, Alma, Materna, Corona, Fabiana and Beata of the Sisters of Christian Charity to Reading. A lay teacher, Miss Stewart, taught them the English language.
- 1878 - school children show an aptitude for both German and English in oral examinations. Typical School day begins with Mass at 7:30 A.M. Classes to 11:00 A.M. Lunch to 1:00 P.M. Classes for lower grades to 3:30 P.M., for upper grades to 4:00 P.M. Examinations are oral, conducted twice a year by the priests and lasting as long as two weeks.
- 1880 - Mother Pauline Mallinkrodt, foundress of the Sisters of Christian Charity, conducted the school examina-

tions and a small remembrance for a perfect examination given by her became a proud possession of many in later years when her process of beatification had been introduced.

Fr. Bornemann dedicates Church of Sts. Cyril and Methodius which he built and paid for and presented to the Slavonic people of Reading. It is located at 6th and Laurel Sts. in Reading.

- 1882 - a new convent is built for the Sisters of Christian Charity.
- 1884 - Fr. Bornemann is named Secretary of the Commission of the Faith and permanent Rector of St. Paul's.
- 1886 - Fr. Bornemann is first to be named to the newly formed Diocesan School Board. He also authorizes extensive renovations to the church. Over 3000 parishioners now comprise St. Paul's Parish.
- 1889 - Orphanage for boys is opened on 9th St. next to the church. The House of The Good Shepherd is opened at 4th and Pine Sts. Fr. Bornemann buys property at 12th and Spruce Sts. and helps open St. Mary's Parish.
- 1895 - St. Cecelia's Chapel, a beautiful brownstone edifice, was built by Theodore I. Heizmann in memory of his mother Mary Cecelia Heizmann. Ceremonies of dedication are in charge of Fr. Bornemann with Solemn Mass celebrated by Rev. Dr. J. J. Koch, Vicar General of the Harrisburg Diocese.
- 1900 - the House of the Good Shepherd is dedicated on land donated by Fr. Bornemann.
- 1904 - Fr. Bornemann buys old Reformed Church at Schuylkill Ave. and Green Sts. and refits it as Catholic Church for Italian Catholics in Holy Rosary Parish.
- 1906 - Fr. Bornemann assists the Bernardine Sisters to build and establish a convent and orphanage at Millmont. Fr. Bornemann donates 17 acres of land (site of the Neversink Mt. Hotel) to the Berks County Tuberculosis Society.

REV. GERHARD WALLMEYER,

In his short tenure as pastor this energetic young priest, the second of St. Paul's rectors, started Catholic education in Reading when he opened a boys' school in the basement of the church. He died of typhoid fever in 1867.



Fr. Bornemann transforms former Academy for Girls into a sanitorium for tubercular members of religious orders. Cost, \$30,000. Original Academy was built with money left by Henry Felix.

Fr. Bornemann rebuilds St. Mary's Church at Hamburg at his own expense.

Fr. Bornemann establishes Gethsemane Cemetery.

1910 - *after 43 years as Pastor Fr. Bornemann is elevated to rank of Domestic Prelate with title of Right Rev. Monsignor.*

1913 - *Msgr. Bornemann named Rural Dean of Berks County.*

1914 - *Msgr. Bornemann renovates former public school at 3rd and Franklin Sts, and presents it to Holy Rosary Church as a parochial school.*

1915 - *Msgr. Bornemann supervises construction of school and church in Wyomissing and establishes Sacred Heart Parish with his nephew, Rev. Charles J. Bornemann, as pastor. Ground was donated by the Wyomissing Industries.*

a new steeple is erected to replace the previous 200 ft. structure which was destroyed by lightning. The present familiar gold cross was placed atop the new square type steeple.

Msgr. Bornemann celebrates his Golden Jubilee.

1916 - *two story annex to St. Paul's school is completed at cost of \$12,000.*

1917 - *Msgr. Bornemann celebrates his Golden Jubilee as pastor. Under leadership of Charles Vogel a sum of \$50,000 (\$1000 for each year) is contributed by parishioners and used to beautify church exterior.*

1917 to 1924 . . . these were years of continued service and achievement by this great and good man but now, with heavy heart, I saw his health failing rapidly and finally, on March 3, 1924 God called his noble soul to Himself. Msgr. Bornemann, after 57 years of devoted service to God,

the church, the parish and the community, left a legacy of humility and nobility. His priestly life exemplified the words of St. Paul. "There remains only faith, hope and charity. Of these, the greatest is charity."

Once again I was to welcome a new pastor, destined, however, to a short tenure of four years. Rev. Theodore Hammeke was his name and even though God gave him only four short years with me his achievements are immeasurable in time. He immediately arranged for a spiritual census of my people and then established the societies that have been a pillar of strength from that day to this. The first of these was the Holy Name Society. Nearly 200 were enrolled at the first meeting.

1926 - *the Holy Family Society is formed.*

The Catholic Women's Union (St. Paul's Welfare League) is established with quarters in the old orphanage.

Fr. Hammeke divides the parish into districts. Convent is renovated. Cost, \$36,000.

1927 - *the Usher Society is formed.*

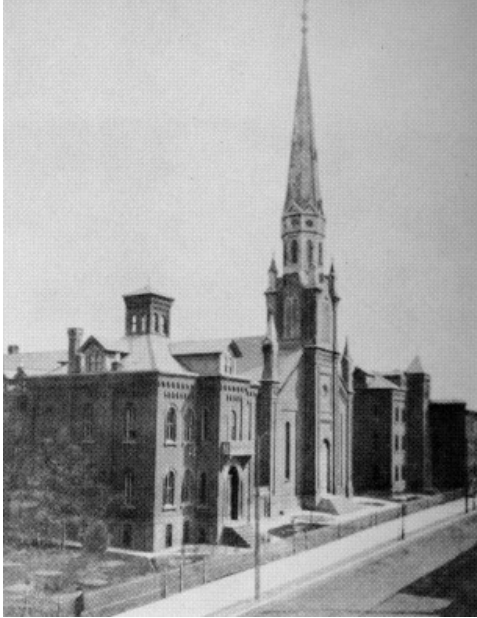
St. Paul's Commercial School is established as a department of the parochial school. The very latest equipment is installed.

Remodeling of interior of church is started. Project to cost \$100,000.

1928 - *during reconstruction of the church Fr. Hammeke contracts pneumonia probably due to his constant "on the job" inspection and supervision of the work.*

Fr. Hammeke was to see the completion of his project before his death on May 13, 1928. His pastorate attested to the great zeal for the welfare of the people entrusted to his care.

Again I was to see the name Hammeke in the archives

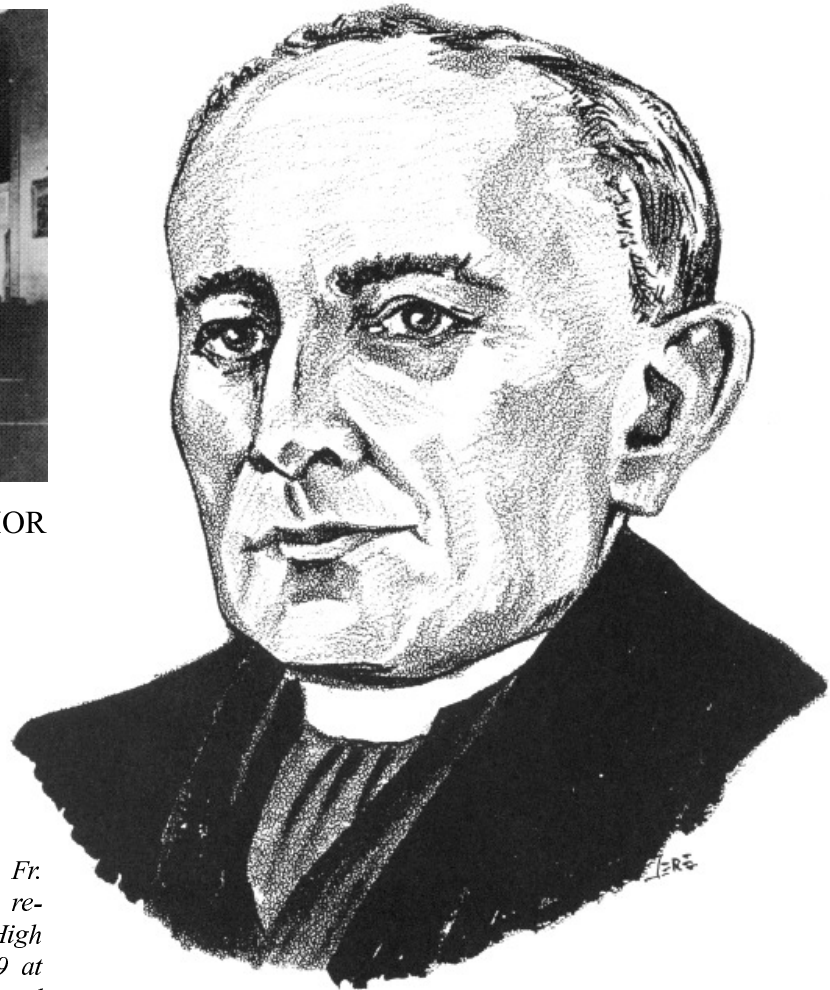
CENTRAL CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH-RENOVATED INTERIOR

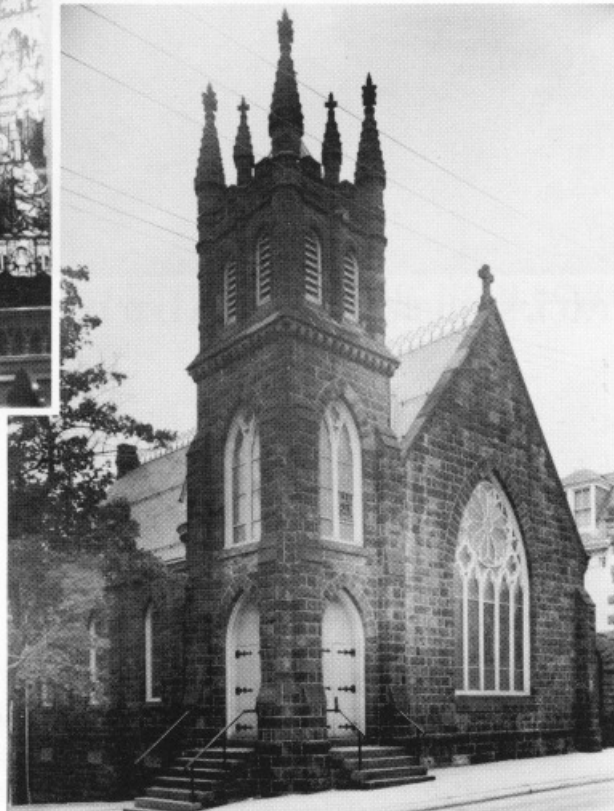


REV. WILLIAM HAMMEKE,
RECTOR, 1928-1949

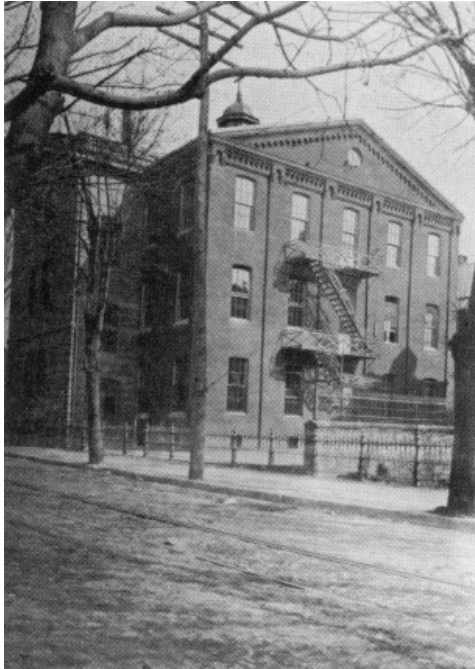

of my first one hundred years. Dennis Cardinal Dougherty named the Rev. William Hammeke, brother of Fr. Theodore Hammeke, to guide my people and finish the work begun in the short tenure of my late pastor. Fr. Hammeke was not only faced with completing the renovations to the church but with paying for them since the original estimate of \$100,000 was to be exceeded.

1929 - *official opening of the renovated church. First Solemn Mass is presided over by His Eminence Cardinal Dougherty.*

1930 - *the Msgr. Bornemann Memorial Chapel in Gethsemane Cemetery is completed. Improvements and renovations to the cemetery are made. The "Agony Group" is made a permanent shrine.*

1936 - *the parish celebrates its Diamond Jubilee.*

1939 - *Fr. Hammeke celebrates his Golden Jubilee at age 77. Rev. Charles Allwein presents him with a purse of \$3000 from the parishioners.*

Fr. Hammeke buys Luden estate at Hill Rd. and Clymer St. and establishes Central Catholic High School with enrollment of 75.

1941 - *annex to school is begun. Enrollment now 180.*

1943 - *Fr. Hammeke, in failing health, celebrates his 81st birthday and requests that he be relieved of many of his duties. Cardinal Dougherty appoints Rev. John Wachter as administrator of the parish affairs.*

Fr. Hammeke received permission to set up a small chapel in one of the large rooms of his residence at 1017 Elm St. so that he could celebrate Holy Mass. On May 20, 1949, at the age of 86, the oldest priest in point of age and service in the diocese, Fr. Hammeke passed away. He had guided my people for 21 years and his pastorate is marked by outstanding devotion and achievement, not the least of these being the founding of Central Catholic High School.

For the sixth time I was without a pastor but there was a difference. Fr. Wachter, who was acting administrator for the years between 1946 and 1949, had conducted the affairs of my people with great vigor. He had purchased ground and established an athletic field in neighboring St. Lawrence. He saw Central Catholic High School accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in 1948. With the able assistance of the first principal and co-founder of Central Catholic High School, Fr. Charles L. Allwein, he guided the school through its formative years.

1949 - *Fr. Wachter is named Rector of St. Paul's.*

1952 - *Fr. Wachter is elevated to Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Rev. Monsignor.*

1953 - *parishioners and community alike honor Msgr. Wachter at a testimonial dinner.*

Msgr. Wachter is named Vicar Forane for Berks County.

1954 - *demolition of buildings adjacent to church on 9th St. begins. Site will become a parking lot for parishioners.*

Msgr. Wachter is named Secretary for the Diocesan Commission of Vigilance for the Faith.

Under direction of Fr. John Brughmans of the Congregation of the Immaculate Heart of Mary a Catholic Center is established on N. 3rd St.

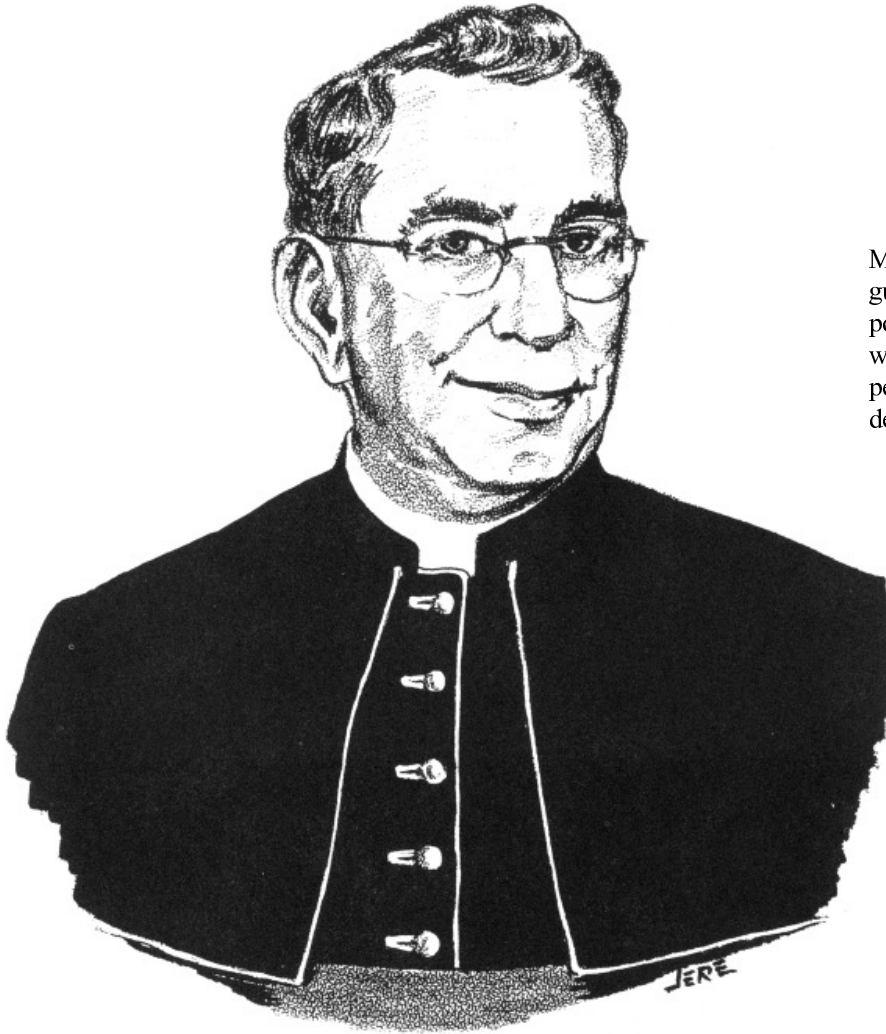
On September 24, 1955 at the age of 67 Msgr. Wachter died suddenly. So well was he loved by both religious and laity I must note here that 25 Monsignori, 220 priests and 200 Nuns attended his Solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass and over 10,000 persons viewed his remains lying in state in St. Paul's Church. It was said of him that, "Man's life can be divided into three parts; the past, the present and eternity. Through his work Monsignor Wachter has re-

ceived honor in the first two and can look forward to being honored by God in the third."

The passing of Msgr. Wachter, the sixth of my good and faithful pastors, marks the end of those fruitful decades of the past. I must now talk about the things I see today. At the turn of the first century of my life I look with pride upon the events I have just recounted and with joy and abiding faith in the present and with hopeful and prayerful anticipation in the future . . . for those who guide me now past the curve of the first hundred years continue, in their loving devotion, to guide me into the century to come.

“... those who guide me past the turn of a century”

The end of my first century was but 5 short years ahead when I welcomed the priest who was to guide my people across the span of the first hundred years and into the beginnings of the next hundred years. In November of 1955 His Excellency Archbishop O'Hara appointed the Rev. Henry J. Huesman as permanent rector of my church. Fr. Huesman, a Reading native, had been associated with the parochial school system in Allentown, Pa. where, for 20 years he had labored as teacher, professor and principal of Allentown's Central Catholic High School.

Fr. Huesman, endowed with an ability to make friends plus an affinity for action along with a prodigious energy to sustain him, soon began to make his presence felt not only in behalf of my people and my church but also in the community and its environs.

1956 - *complete renovation of St. Paul's Church, including sacristy and side chapels.*

1957 - *renovations in the rectory include extension of domestic quarters, dining room, kitchen and laundry.*

1958 - *a new baptistry is completed.*

Fr. Huesman celebrates the 25th Anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood.

Renovations in St. Paul's convent include dining room, community room and parlors.

1959 - *a new convent to house 22 Sisters of Christian Charity who teach in Central Catholic High School is built at 1500 Eckert Ave. in Reading.*

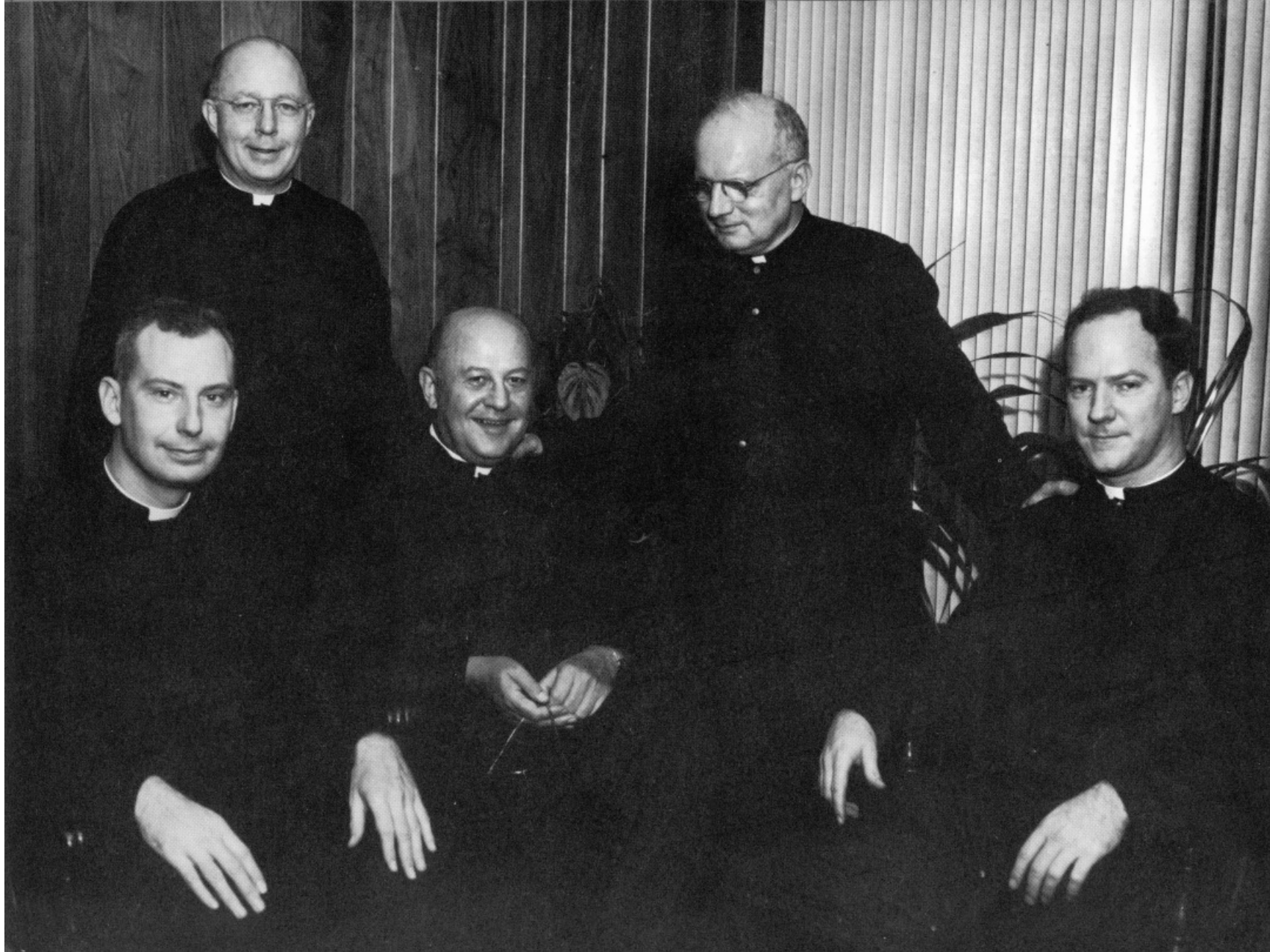
1960 - *Fr. Huesman supervises the building of a modern new maintenance building, a new business building and superintendent's quarters at Gethsemane Cemetery.*

1961 - *construction is started on a new elementary school at St. Paul's replacing the existing 91 year old structure. Bishop McShea appoints Fr. Huesman superintendent of schools for the newly created Diocese of Allentown.*

The chronology of Fr. Huesman's accomplishments is, at this writing, only a part of the credit entries in the book of events that end a century and begin another. The fruits of his energy at the diocesan level, for instance, cannot be measured in cold figures.

He was Spiritual Director, Berks-Montgomery Regional Holy Name Union; Director, Archbishop's Committee for Christian Home and family for Berks County; Chaplain, Catholic Committee on Scouting where he has an enviable record of 36 years of service in the Boy Scouts of America; Spiritual Director, Ladies of Charity; Chaplain, Reading Serra Club; Director, Catholic Center in Reading; Director of Gethsemane Cemetery and Director, Catholic Social Agency, Berks County.

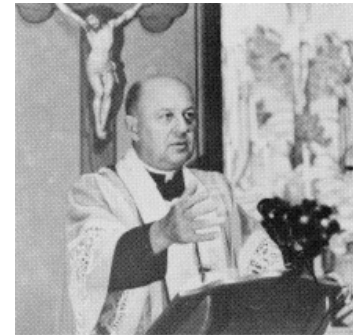

**REV. HENRY J. HUESMAN, RECTOR,

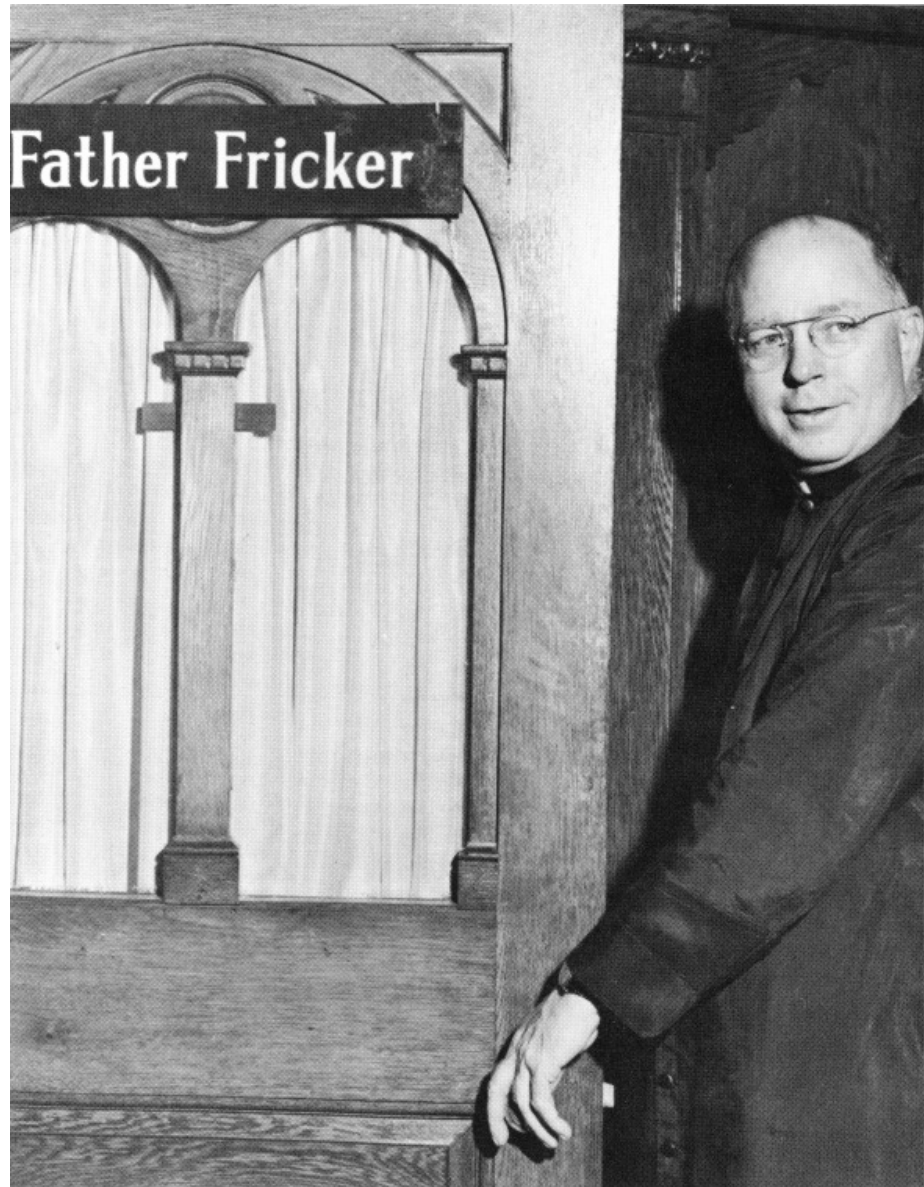
REV. RAYMOND J. LEICHNER,

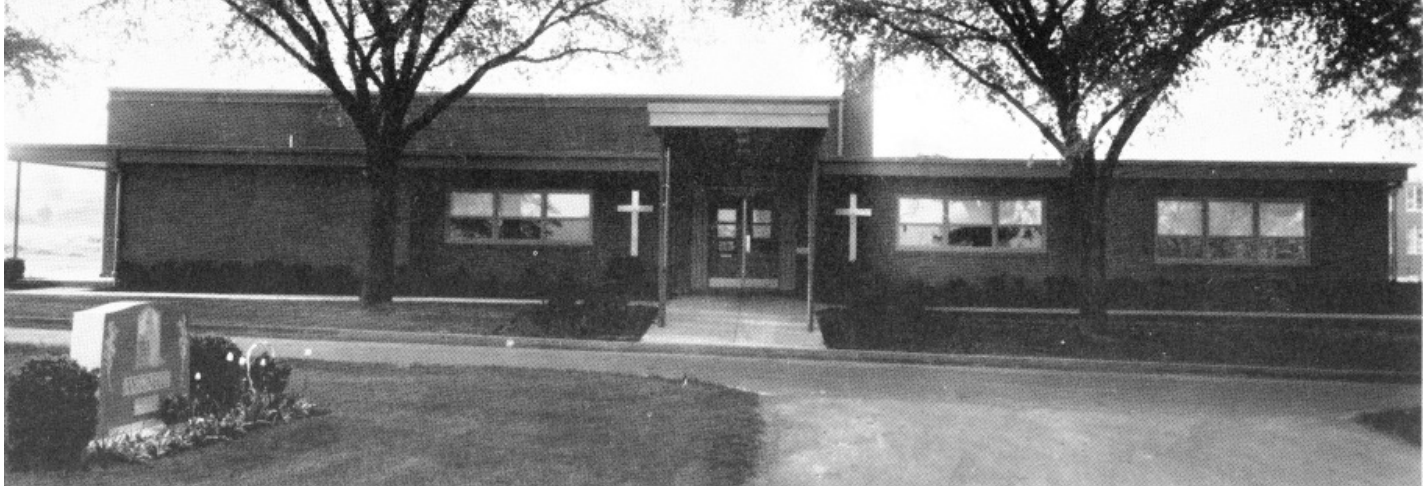

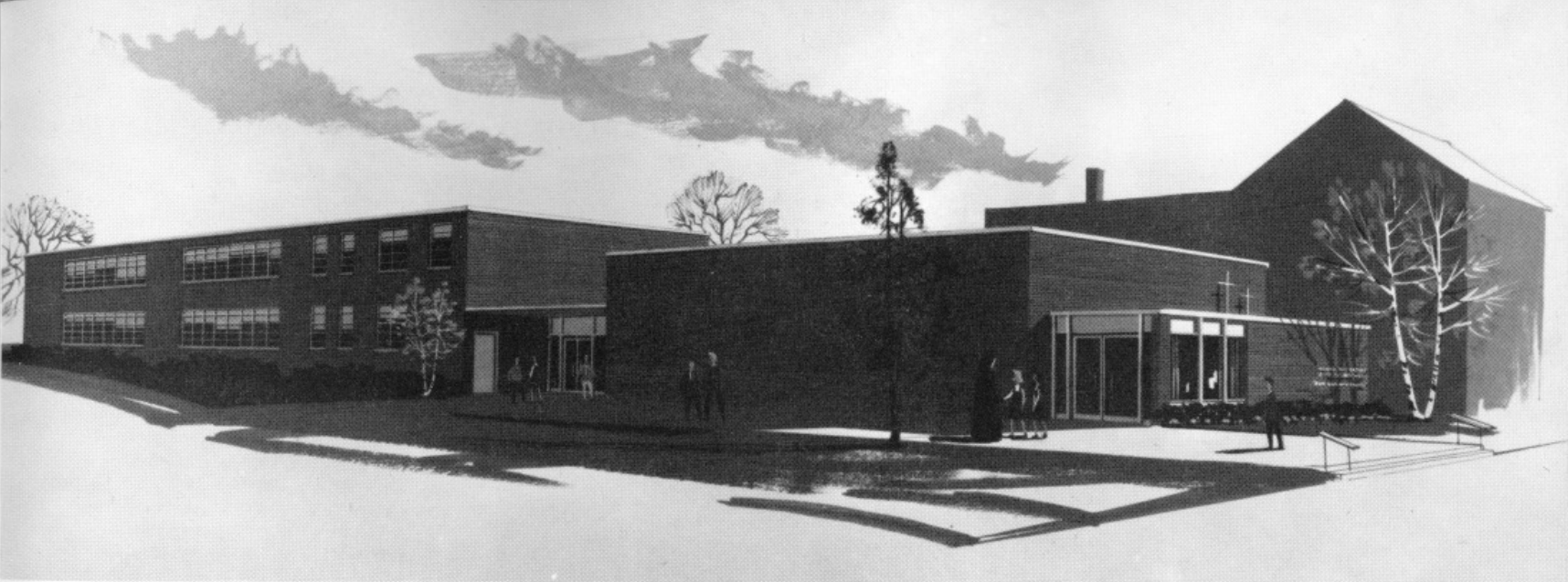
